Sonata in C Major - W. A. Mozart

Johannes Chrysostomus Wolfgangus Theophilus Mozart was born in January 1756, in Salzburg, Austria. He was one of six children but only he and his sister "Nannerl" survived infancy.

He wrote his first symphony when he was only eight-years-old. In all, **Mozart** composed more than 600 **pieces** of music and is widely considered to be one of the greatest composers in the history of Western music.

Among those pieces were 18 piano Sonatas which were given "K." numbers in reference to Köchel, the cataloguer. A low **K number** indicates a piece written when **Mozart** was very young, while a high **number** indicates a piece written at the end of his life.

This Sonata in C Major is K. 545 which indicates that he wrote this particular Sonata later in his life. The first movement of a Sonata is typically in Sonata-Allegro form which means there are three parts: Exposition, Development, and Recapitulation. During the Exposition, the main themes of the piece are introduced. In the Development section of a sonata, the thematic material is changed. In this sonata Mozart puts the development in the dominant minor key and uses the scales and arpeggio thematic material from the Exposition in several different keys. The Recapitulation begins in the subdominant major key and eventually modulates back to the key of C Major.

Birch Tree Rag Duet - Robert D. Vandall

Mr. Vandal has published more than 400 works for the piano.

The title of this piece, **Birch Tree Rag**, is appropriately named because it's a rag which is a style of jazz with a lot of syncopation in the melody part and a steadily accented accompaniment. *Birch Tree Rag* exhibits these characteristics in both parts of the duet. ~Collaborated by Juliana Gole and Grace Vanden Berge~

Ballade - Friederich Burgmuller

Friedrich Burgmuller was born in Regensburg, Germany and lived from 1806-1874 during the Classical period of music. Friedrich Burgmuller was most famous for his three collections of teaching pieces for children.

The name of this piece is **Ballade**. A ballade is a genre of solo piano pieces written in a balletic narrative style, often with lyrical elements interspersed. In this piece, it tells the story of someone exploring, and the loud, accented notes that come are signs of this person discovering something interesting and exciting.

Sonatina in C Major Op. 36, No. 3 - Muzio Clementi

Muzio Clementi was born in Rome, Italy and lived from 1752 to 1832 during the Classical period of music. Some of Clementi's better-known pieces of music include Sonatina in C, Op. 36 No. 1 and Symphony No. 1 in C major, No 32. While he didn't necessarily have a standout, excellent piece renowned around the world, he wrote over 60 Sonatas for the piano alone. His studies and sonatas helped develop the techniques of the early piano, giving him the nickname "the father of the piano."

This piece is the third Sonatina in Clementi's 36th Opus (of sonatinas). It follows the traditional setup of any sonatina (or mini sonata), complete with an Exposition, Development, and Recapitulation. The Exposition begins with a lighthearted but full melody in the Key of C. It then transitions to a "dolce," or sweet, secondary theme in the Key of G. The Development is concise, consisting of an almost "upside-down" version of the main theme. Finally, the Recapitulation brings the main theme back, only this time, an octave lower. With a hint of flare, we arrive at the secondary theme, now in the Key of C, which takes the piece to a contented end. ~Jake Barnes~

Oh! Susanna! - Stephen Collins Foster Arr. by Timothy Brown

Timothy Brown is a contemporary composer still alive today. "Oh! Susanna" was the first huge hit song in American popular music. Stephen Foster was born in Lawrenceville, Pennsylvania, U.S. and lived from 1826 to 1864 during the Romantic music period. Stephen taught himself to play the piano and he did not have any formal training in compositions, but he became famous for composing more than 200 songs. He is often referred to as the Father of American Music, was only 21 years old when he composed "Oh Susanna!" in 1848.

The name Susanna may have referred to Foster's deceased sister Charlotte, whose middle name was Sussannah. No American song had sold more than 5,000 copies before; "Oh! Susanna" sold over 100,000. After its publication, it quickly became known as an "unofficial theme of the <u>Forty-Niners</u>", with new lyrics about traveling to California during the gold rush with a "<u>wash pan</u> on my knee". As its lyrics suggest, the song is about a young man traveling through the south, separated from his lovely Susanna, and telling her he'll be home soon. ~ Collaborated program notes ~Jacob Barnes and Nathan Jones~

The Grand Tetons - Valerie Roth Roubos

Valerie Roth Roubos is a contemporary American composer. She has a piano studio in Washington. Valerie was selected as the Composer of the Year in 2001 with the South Dakota Teachers Association and 2006 with the Washington State Music Teachers Association. She is a believer of all students are able to play expressive music.

The Grand Tetons is a piece of music from An American Portrait: Views of the West published by The FJH Music Company, Inc. in 2010, written by Valerie. The music has a grand sound that portrays tall snowy mountains from the Jackson Hole Valley. The valley is between the Teton Mountain Range and the Gros Ventre Range in Wyoming sitting near the border of Idaho.

His first public performance was at the age of seventeen. Gurlitt produced everything ranging from songs, teaching pieces, operas, cantatas and symphonies. He died back in his hometown, Altona at the age of 81.

Habanera from Carmen - Georges Bizet

The Habanera is a Cuban dance that came to Spain in the mid-19th century. It is typically in 2/4 time and uses a dotted rhythm pattern. This Habanera from "Carmen" is an aria, sung by the titular character named Carmen used in this instance to seduce the men in a café. This Habanera has a chromatic melody that starts in D minor and then changes to the parallel key of D major.

Georges Bizet was born in Paris, France on October 25, 1838, and died on June 3, 1875. He is a French composer who is most known for writing operas in the romantic period of music. ~ Corroborated by Bennett Guensche & Liana Boersma~

After Midnight & Bourbon Street Saturday Night - William Gillock

William Gillock was born in La Russell, United States on July 1, 1917 and lived to September 7, 1993. He lived during the Contemporary period of music. Gillock is most known for teaching, composing, and holding workshops. Gillock lived in New Orleans during the big band swing era of jazz music. This most definitely influenced his compositions.

The name **After Midnight** gives a unique perspective of New Orleans. It shows the less frantic scene of the city after midnight as the song's name implies. This piece uses the una corda pedal to soften the tone of the strings.

The song **Bourbon Street** Saturday Night gets its name from a particularly lively street in New Orleans, Louisiana. This piece utilizes dominant seven chords. These four note chords are very prevalent in jazz.

Canon in D - Johann Pachelbel/Arr. Faber

Johann Pachelbel was born in the Free Imperial City of Nuremberg and lived from 1653 to 1706 during the baroque period of music. Johann Pachelbel was known for his works for organ and one of the great organ masters of the generation before Johann Sebastian Bach.

Canon in D was originally written for three violins and basso continuo. A canon is a polyphonic device by which several voices play the same music, entering in sequence. In the original Canon in D, the first violin begins, the second violin enters two bars later and the third enters two bars after that. They play exactly the same melody. This particular arrangement for piano was created by Nancy and Randall Faber.

Tarantella - Albert Pieczonka

Albert Pieczonka was born on February 10, 1828 in Königsberg, Prussia. Pieczonka is a composer who has performed in Prussia, England, and the United States. His most famous piece he composed was "Tarantella in A Minor" And has remained his most famous piece 100 years after his death.

Tarantella is a rapid, whirling dance originating in southern Italy. This is represented in the piece when the keys "twirl" high up on the piano with a alternating bass. The piece is written in 6/8 time and has a rapid tune which is another key of the word Tarantella in a music definition.

Norwegian Dance - Edward Grieg

Edward Grieg was born in Bergen, Norway and lived from 1843 to 1907 during the Romantic period of music. Grieg was most famous for his development of Norwegian folk music. In the spring of 1860, he survived two life-threatening lung diseases, pleurisy and tuberculosis. Throughout his life, Grieg's health was impaired by a destroyed left lung and considerable deformity of his thoracic spine. He suffered from numerous respiratory infections, and ultimately developed combined lung and heart failure. Grieg was admitted many times to spas and sanatoria both in Norway and abroad. Several of his doctors became his personal friends.

The name of this piece is **Norwegian Dance**. Norwegian dances, along with other Scandinavian dances, are primarily social in nature as opposed to religious or ritualistic.

Norwegian dances were danced for fun at festive occasions such as weddings, midsummer, Christmas, and just plain parties. ~Samantha McClelland & Anna Alt~

Scherzo - Gurlitt

Cornelius Gurlitt was born in Altona, Germany and lived from 1820 to 1901 during the Romantic period of music. His first public appearance at the age of seventeen was well received, and he decided to go to Copenhagen to continue his studies. There he studied organ, piano, and composition under Curlander and Weyse. In 1842, Gurlitt moved to Hørsholm, where he resided as organist and music teacher for four years. When the Schleswig-Holstein war broke out in 1849, Gurlitt became a <u>military band</u> master. His output was prodigious in quantity and breadth, ranging from songs and teaching pieces to operas, <u>cantatas</u>, and symphonies.

The name of this piece, **Scherzo**, means a vigorous, light, or playful composition, often in ABA form and sometimes one of the movements in a symphony or sonata. This scherzo by Gurlitt, stands on its own.
